

The eighth bell is inscribed: TO THE GLORY OF GOD THIS CHIME OF BELLS WAS PART OF A GIFT TO THIS CHURCH B Y ALICE CLEMENTS A PARISHIONER .A. D. 1929. The old bells are - rob tomlinson vil copland 1624 (Founder probably William Oldfield)

Young Ringers' Get- Together 30 December

It all started as a vague idea. I was conscious of the fact that some towers had a few young people now learning to ring, and others had only one. For some time I thought it would be good if they could get together for ringing and fun to get encouragement from knowing there are others out there. The idea festered, then suddenly took off, seemingly of its own volition. I mentioned it over coffee after morning service in December, asking Brian if he thought his grandson (a third generation ringer learning at Waddington) might be interested. In about five minutes the whole thing was planned! -`Where are you thinking of holding it?' -`I haven't thought about it yet' -`Why not come here? There is the room upstairs and the balcony for activities.' Then Brian's wife added, 'We (she and John's wife) will see to the catering.' That settled it! Cathy, a local ringer and the churchwarden, said, `Come! I'll put the heating on for you and open up the toilets at the Village Hall.'

Out went invitations to all we knew about, inviting them to come and bring their ringing mentor (if they could come) and food. We were thus ensured of enough experienced ringers to support us. We assured the church treasurer that there would be a donation towards the cost, and he kindly put the heating on the night before, so that although it was a very cold day, we were lovely and warm. I was concerned about the wisdom of ringing all day, but was assured that, because the church is at the edge of the village, the only people likely to be disturbed were those at the adjacent Hall, and as they would be away anyhow, they readily gave their permission.

The ten young ringers (we had expected 12, but 2 were unable to make it at the last minute) were divided into 2 groups according to who else they knew, and each had an hour in the tower while Margaret Neate organised handbells. After lunch (how much food they brought - and ate!) they were divided again into 2 groups, call changes or change ringing, each having another three quarters of an hour in the tower.

I think it is safe to say they enjoyed it - they all said they wanted to repeat the experience. We are therefore looking for Easter (possibly Waddington), and Blankney in the summer (where the field will provide room for more energetic games for those who like that sort of thing!) If you have any school aged ringers who would like to join in, let me know.

News from the towers

The first peal by an all local band for over 50 years was rung at Dunston. It was first peal for Sam Palmer who managed without getting any blisters!

After reading the last Newsletter I have been (tongue in cheek) asked for a refund on the Christmas cards I sold her. I think you all spotted the mistake when I said they were £ 1.50 a pack. Of course those who paid £2.50 were right, but still a pretty good bargain!

What does it mean?

Readers of the Newsletter are sometimes puzzled by expressions they find there. If you don't understand the terms ask. These are some from the quarter peal columns I have been asked about recently.

'Circled the tower'. The ringer in question has rung at least one quarter peal on each bell in that tower.

With 6-8 covering, 7 missing' This appeared under a quarter rung at Metheringham. Doubles was rung on the front 5 with 6 and 8 'drumming behind' (giving 6 then 8 the last two bells to ring every change) and as the 7th is currently out of action, it was not rung at all. (If Doubles is rung in an 8 bell tower, it is often 'covered' by 7-6-8 which gives a musical alternative to just having the tenor last bell every change).

Some of you might be puzzled y the `lapping' which was a great success at the young ringers' day. This is change ringing, not by counting your place, but by physically moving to your new position in each change. This can only be done with handbells. Don't try it in the tower!!!

One ringer always seems to look in the opposite direction to the bell she is following. When asked about it she said, `Steve Coleman's book said to look at them out of the corner of your eye.' I think Steve was really encouraging ringers to look generally at all the ropes (even out of the corner of your eye), rather than stare too closely at the bell you are following in order to be prepared to amend a wrong decision and not miss the following bell. It does help the other ringers if they can guess where you think you are!

Obituary

Colin Hancock - 2008

Colin died 11 th December 2008 aged 69. Having learned to bell ring at Barlaston, Staffs in his teens, Colin moved to Fulbeck with his wife and young family, and resumed ringing in 1976, helping to teach a newly formed group in the village. Colin gave up ringing a number of years ago due to ill health.

Stan Smith, 1914 - 2009

On January 5 2009 Stan Smith died aged 94 years. In the 1960's he was Churchwarden of St Chad's Dunholme and also tower captain, and it was at this time that the ringing chamber was moved from the bottom floor to where it is now.

He rang in 49 peals and his name is on 17 different church peal boards. Being a keen bellringer he taught a lot of people to ring. He also organised several ringing outings to various parts of the county. In later life he was always interested in what family ringers did, especially as his great grandson has taken up the hobby.

A quarter peal was rung on Saturday January I7th in memory of Stan at Dunholme by members of his family and friends who had rung with him in earlier years.

Congratulations

To Sam Palmer of Metheringham on ringing his first peal (at the age of 13) He rang the Treble to Bob Doubles at Dunston.
