All Saints North Scarle

It is good news that after years of planning and fund-raising, North Scarle has at long last received a Faculty from the Chancellor in May 2011 allowing them to proceed with the Bell Project. Sadly, although they did originally have enough money, the frustrating delays mean that inflation has caused costs to be very much higher than originally guoted. Consequently the last six months have been dedicated to raising the necessary funds. As expected, this has not proved to be an easy task and the current state of the economy has added to the problems. Whereas there has been some success, there have also been very many disappointments, but we have had to remain positive. The Guild BRF has pledged approximately £10,000 towards the cost of the project; consequently the fund now stands at around £49,000 with £56,000 being the sum needed for the work to the bells/bell-frame. There are other (as yet unknown) costs regarding the cutting of pockets and the casting of level pad stones in the tower walls - plus the preparation/construction of trap-ways in all floors to facilitate raising/lowering of bells, frames etc.

On a happier note, there has been some interest in learning to ring the bells. Sandra Underwood is currently training two people from North Scarle but obviously we shall need more ringers to cope with our planned ring of six bells. Even here there have been set-backs. One of the recruits, having made a good start, fell on the ice and broke her

wrist. Her first reaction was, 'Oh, I shan't be able to ring now!' We wish her well, and hope that she has developed enough enthusiasm to want to come back in the future!

Nigel Pendleton worked tirelessly throughout to forward this project and was often frustrated by the repeated delays caused by the heritage authorities. His final words at the last meeting were, 'I probably shan't be still here to see it! Sadly he was right, dying soon after, and I think we owe it to him to make it all happen.

There are various activities planned to publicise the project, not only as a recruiting drive, but also help raise the remaining funds. Do look out for news of various events, and lend our own wholehearted support, as individuals and a group.

Please note that there are now quiz sheets being sold at £1 each in aid of the North Scarle bell fund - available from Fiona and all committee members, plus the usual suspects. Remember to get yours as soon as you can. You have till the end of June to complete them.

After more ringing, including 8-spliced, we retired for a well earned lunch of pie, mash and peas, courtesy of Dot and Betty, followed by desserts brought by all and cheese and biscuits.

Some afternoon ringing saw some two handed potty ringing before a few of us left to travel to the second ring of the day, leaving 8 behind to attempt a quarter of Yorkshire.

Arriving at the home of Sandra and John, we were welcomed to yet more food and the well installed ringing of 8 garden flower pots, sorry, 8 wonderful ringing pots. The afternoon more or less followed the 'Course' of the morning, ringing Surprise Major including Chedburgh, the sister method to Woodside, before being allowed 10 minutes to learn the 2012 Olympic 'Music' known as 5 Rings Triples. News from the towers

St Mary's, Lincoln. A University band has been started up at St Mary's. Practice night Fridays at 6.15pm. They have made an excellent start, providing ringing for the opening of the Christmas Market by ringing 40 minutes of Call Changes, as well as enjoying a Christmas Social after Practice night. Thank you Chris! We hope they have a happy and successful time ringing and studying in Lincoln, and look forward to meeting them at Branch functions.

John Ketteringham tells me that The **Monday Quarter Pealers** have had a successful 2011, with a wide variety of methods rung with a very high standard of striking. Although not a Branch activity some branch members have certainly benefited from these, and branch towers have been used. Thank you John. If we want to get a much out of ringing, we need to take all opportunities to help us progress. The last major work to be done on **Metheringham bells** was in 1912 when 3 trebles were added to make an 8. In this their centenary the bells are becoming increasingly difficult to handle. The back 4 date from 1620 and are listed for preservation due to age and rarity and an estimate for refurbishment has been given for £10,000 - £15,000. It is also planned for the bell frame to be cleaned and painted by the local band. At this point the two trebles (which are still ringable) will remain untouched. If funds allow at some point they will be refurbished too and either a ringing floor with one set of rope guides be installed (or to remain a ground floor ring with two sets of guides).

St Peter at Gowts have been unringable for the past six years owing to questions about the safety of the tower. The Vicar and PCC have arranged for the Architect to inspect the tower, having been given access to full reports covering the past 50 years. It is good news that after his inspection, including a test ring, he has decided that limited ringing can now take place, happily in time to be able to ring as the Olympic torch passes down High Street. We now await his full report and his suggestions for dealing with tower issues. He has asked for bell hangers to give their suggestions too. In the meantime ringing is severely restricted, by arrangement at all times, no full peals or visiting bands permitted.

It is disturbing to note that that the bell chamber, the intermediate chamber and the ringing chamber were all found to be infested by pigeons, resulting in masses of pigeon guano and a lot of pigeons, dead and alive all over the place.

Ringing Circles.

Apart from an old peal board dated 1813, the ringing records in Nettleham church don't go back very far. In fact the first recorded quarter peal was in May 1960, that of 1260 plain bob minor. Rung for a royal wedding and as a compliment to D. Burkitt. Like many youngsters today, I left home, not to go to university but to join the Navy, and other than going for a ring when I was home on leave there was a lengthy lapse in my ringing career. Just a couple of months before that I rang my first peal, pretty well with the same band of local regular ringers, all of them characters, mostly men in their 50's and 60's. Names of that older generation of today's ringers will remember well: Geoff Parker and his father Bob - I can still remember Bob's wry smile sitting over a pint. There was Charlie Cade from Scothern, one of several generations of a ringing family. He was quite deaf in his later years and when the whole thing fired a smiling Charlie would remark 'Did someone call a bob there?' That reminds me of someone today! Two of the Welton ringers of the time taught me at William Farr School - Harry Bartlett and Angus Dixon our science teacher. A small group of us rang regularly at St Mary's for school services.

I was actually taught to ring at Nettleham by Charlie Jeffries, the ringing master, whose brother Harold was church organist and also one of the Sunday band of ringers. Charlie was a joiner by trade and some of his workmanship can still be seen in the tower today, the donation box with an ingenious locking device was made by him. Sadly Charlie had a stroke whilst ringing for evensong. It took them ages to carry him down from the ringing chamber and he spent the rest of his life at home in the cottage on the green, paralysed.

The male domination of the 60's changed though. A number of youngsters, both boys and girls, learnt to ring, and throughout the 70,s and 80,s a number of guarters and full peals were rung. In 1974 a band of youngsters, three males and three females, average age just 14, rang a 5040 of plain bob minor at Nettleham, the youngest band in Lincolnshire, although I seem to remember that record was broken some years back. It as conducted by a young man called Colin Drabble. So, at Nettleham anyway, we are back with an older band, but a mixed group which nearly always fields a full team for Sunday ringing. Minor methods are being practiced more frequently and newcomers to the village have even remarked that the standard of ringing has improved. I suppose like any other activity, ringing will always go through different phase, through its highs and lows, and whatever statistics show I don't think it is all doom and gloom in the ringing world. By all accounts Chris Woodcock's young band of university ringers are coming along nicely. They too will eventually leave the area and go their own separate ways. Hopefully most of them will stick with it, those that don't might one day return to the ringing circle as I once did.
