What a tremendous achievement for someone who had never rung more than a normal peal length before. We can be very proud of this Lincolnshire lad. He was conductor for the Lincolnshire Poachers national youth competition band several times, and has helped lead the ringing at both the young ringers' summer festivals.

Eastern Branch A joint meeting with the Elloe branch was held at Bicker and Sutterton. This was well attended and much enjoyed. On the same day, Kirton in Holland hosted an ART Module 2 course attended by 9 LDG members. All participants agreed that it was a very good course and that they had lots of ideas for running good practices. The branch QP week resulted in 14 QPs being rung.
