Lincoln Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers Central Branch Newsletter (number 73) March 2011



In 1913 a new church, St Mary's, was built in the heart of Walesby as the old church, All Saints, stands on the hilltop away from the village. The New Church contains an 8-bell carillon, chimed from a baton clavier. In 1934 a 12 cwt peal of 8 bells, hung for full circle ringing, was put into the Old Church as part of its restoration as the 'Ramblers Church'. Jim tells us of his early days learning to ring at Walesby.

'I was one of the first ringers at Walesby New Church as far as I know. Mr Arthur Holbrook was in charge and when he died in 1938 his son, also Arthur Holbrook took over. When he had to go into the army his brother Terry carried on the family tradition. (There are no more sons, but Arty's daughter Margaret married John Bundy, a grand man who now rings at Scothern). As there were no more sons and Terry had to do his National Service the Rev Sharpe asked me to learn. It is an 8 bell carillon, but not like the ordinary board for the ropes hung numbered left to right 12345678, not 87654321. I was about eleven years old, and rang them for the 11 am service and the 6 p.m. For this I was paid £5 a year, which bought me a new set of clothes. A Mr Lazenby (who ran the post office and village shop) wrote me some music. My favourite was 'Now the Day is Over', and when one Sunday morning I was happily ringing it the Rev Sharpe came running down the aisle saving, 'Not that one Jim. That's for the Evening Service'! When I went to Market Rasen Senior School, we went to church on Wednesday mornings. The verger found out I was a ringer. He didn't know it was only a keyboard, and he made me pull a bell up half way. I hadn't a clue what I was doing - I still don't! The vicar asked me 'Why do you not stop to the Morning Service?' I said, 'Do you want a lie or do you want the truth?' His reply was, 'The truth.' 'Well,' I replied, 'I go ferretting for rabbits.' 'So why don't you stop for the Evening Service?' 'Well, all the lads of the village go to RAF Binbrook pictures'. 'And what do your Dad and Mam say about that?'. 'They're not very pleased'. was my reply. 'Well tell them fresh air on a Sunday morning and company with your pals is what you need after working in that shop all week. It's more good for you than listening to my dry sermons. But please make time to ring for our service.' he said.

When my time came to put on uniform I said, 'No more ringing for me when I come home.' Don't you believe it. Mr A Wilkinson got the lads of the village to learn how to ring the Old Church bells and they dragged me along. I made a lot of excuses - a girl to meet; blisters on my hands, (being a hairdresser I couldn't cut hair with sore hands could I?) Eventually the bug caught me. The lads from Claxby and Normanby used to come and we went to Claxby, Grimsby and Caistor. Mr Tom Richardson from Caistor would come home with me to give us lessons. We gave 6d each to the person who took him home for their petrol. It was 'one bell before you; two bells before you etc. ' We had to stand our bell and wait till the right bell had rung before us! We had to watch where we passed the Treble and do our next duty or make 2nds. You soon got rope sight as whilst ringing his bell he stepped across the tower and said, 'Pull now'. When we got to lead he did not teach us open handstroke leads. For years I didn't know what they were. We did not learn as we do today, but from the bell down. 'Pull a bit harder' he would say, or not 'Pull ropes well down.' As anyone who has rung at Walesby knows, the bells are more than a little flighty. I used to ring with one hand at the top of the sally and the other at the bottom.

In 1963 I got married and Margaret and I made our home at Holton cum Beckering. We had the shop at Wragby. They only rang rounds and queens there, calling straight from one to the other - no called changes then! After we'd rung in the New Year we used to go to the Adam and Eve. There was a silver threepenny bit on the windowsill for the ringers, and we didn't have to pay for drinks. We were legal even though we were drinking after hours, because it was a 'private party'. In the summer we used to go to Ingoldmells in the caravan on a Satuday. I used to go and join them nearly every Sunday. I got more interested there and I went with them to a meeting at Wainfleet where I met Horace Bennett from Horncastle, and that's where I took off. I kept going to Caistor. but I was invited to join them at Horncastle too. Tom Richardson told me 'Stop coming to Caistor, but go to Horncastle and learn all you can, then come back and teach us' and that's what I did.' Ron Chafer and Jack Bray in the Northern Branch helped me a lot too. I remember one time they told me to ring closer, and not knowing what they meant, I moved so that I stood closer to the ringer next to me!

Tom Richardson used to say 'A good ring up and a good ring down, no matter what you do in the middle' It was the who impressed on me that **if you want to ring methods, you must be prepared to travel**.

The Monday Morning Quarter Pealers

I started arranging Quarter Peals on Monday mornings at towers I could manage both for weight and access when I felt confident that I could start ringing again after an operation for an abdominal aneurysm. As well as helping me to keep ringing I have looked out for opportunities to help ringers to advance their ringing and to practice conducting. The standard of ringing is high but we are a friendly group and like to consolidate this friendship by adjourning o the local hostelry for refreshments after ringing! I also arrange a quarter peal at Welbourn when there is an evening service. As word has got round the numbers wishing to ring has grown. In 2010 we rang 47 quarters in which 41 ringers took part. During 2011 I intend to encourage more ringers to have a go at conducting.

In arranging the quarters, after having selected the band, I then decide on a method to ring which will produce the best possible striking. I am sure all who have taken part will agree that this approach has been successful. If any Lincolnshire ringer would like to join us let me know what you would like to ring or conduct, and I'll do my best to fit you in but there is quite a waiting list!

Obituary Stanley (Stan) Burns 1928 - 2010
