Obituary John Bundy 1937 - 2015

John learnerd to ring in Mortlake in Surrey as a lad, when his voice broke and he could no longer sing in the choir. After leaving school he got an engineering apprenticeship in Lincoln and became a very active member of the band at St Peter at Gowts, ringing all round the area. There is a board recording his first peal rang at Welton in 1956. (He later rang in the peal celebrating the 50th anniversary of that peal). Unfortunately the firm he worked for closed and he was left with a young family and no job, finally finding a place in an American company. For the rest of his working life he worked abroad, mainly in the Middle East becoming the expert on pumps in the oil pipeline industry. His family remained in England and we would occasionally see John at Scothern practices when he was home on holiday.

After he retired and was home for good, he threw himself wholeheartedly into his ringing until his final illness prevented him. It was typical of John that he spent so much of his time helping to teach ringers. He joined the practises at Welton, Dunholme and Scothern, his local group of parishes. and Nettleham, adding stability to learning bands. When the Millennium bells were being installed at Hackthorn, he cheerfully joined the group of three ringers in teaching a new band and he continued to the end to help the band to grow. John's skill as a draughtsman is shown on a peal board he made following the first peal at Hackthorn. (There followed other peal boards which proudly hang in the ringing rooms of Dunholme and Welton. Picture of one celebrating his repeat peal 50 years on, can be found later in these pages.) It is a tribute to him that the Hackthorn ringers agreed that they did not want to ring a quarter to his memory, for that would cut out some members and they all wanted to pay their tribute to him. This sentiment was echoed by other towers that he helped. (Hackthorn did things in true Hackthorn style - they started with a prayer and finished with a glass of wine!) Scothern Church was packed for his funeral and a half muffled guarter peal started as the cortege set off for the crematorium, rung by six people who visited him during his last illness. It was the best ringing on the bells that we can remember - we did him proud! John was a benign influence thoughout the area and we shall remember him for his quiet good humour and friendship. RIP

Obituary Roy Edward Chapman 1946 – 2015

Roy was a man of very wide interests and expertise – gardening, archaeology, local history, classical music, theatre, DIY, to name but a few. When he retired in 2002, he decided he wanted to add bell ringing to that list. At that time the Lincolnshire Echo was giving much publicity to the project to augment Thorpe–on–the Hill bells to six, so Roy decided that was where he wanted to be. Having bought a house there, he threw himself into every aspect of village life. As it was not practical to tie Thorpe bells, he travelled to Nettleham to learn to handle a bell. Back in Thorpe he became an enthusiastic member of the band ensuring there would be six ringers ringing for every service. When Eric, the Tower Captain died he took on the roll of ensuring that the bells were rung. A perfectionist, he firmly believed that it was far better to ring good rounds rather than attempting 'fancy stuff'. M.A.P.

Ron Everett has kindly sent his thoughts on Roy -----

Roy was the lynchpin of ringing at Thorpe, ever enthusiastic to encourage new ringers whether teenagers or retirees. Following the incapacity of Willie Turner, last year, he has been unstinting in his help and support of ringing at Harby. It amused him greatly when he learned I was struggling with Plain Hunt at Bassingham (as a pensioner) as was he at Thorpe. He invited me to join the Wednesday practice at Thorpe / Eagle and I have enjoyed the last 5 years immensely. Sitting in warm evening sunshine, prior to ringing, sharing a bowl of his Condor, learning the state of his allotment and progress at Ellis Windmill -- made our inadequacies with Grandsire & Stedman bearable. Roy would have been confounded by the number of friends, work colleagues and family, who packed the delightful church of St. Michael to say cheerio, and the band who rang a quarter of his beloved Grandsire. 




Little Gems which help the bells go round.

Helping the learner to control the Sally.



Lincoln Diocesan Guild AGM on Saturday 25th April.

This year, Communion Service was held at St Hugh's Shrine in Lincoln Cathedral since the Ringer's Chapel was temporarily unavailable. The Guild Ringing Master, mindful that St Hugh's Shrine was as far away from the Ringing Chamber as you could be, finished service ringing a little earlier than normal. Descending down the tower and walking along the length of the Cathedral, we arrived just in time for the start of the service. The Dean (The Very Reverend Philip Buckler) took the service with our own multi-talented Washingborough Tower Captain and Guild web master, Jonathan Clark, as the server.

After communion, we met at the Bailgate Methodist Church for the Guild AGM which was less eventful and controversial than last year. No mention was made of changing the name of the Guild. Guild Officers were re-elected and subtle changes were made to the rules. Points were raised about the publication of the Peal Compositions when the Dean of Lincoln advised that this could be considered at Guild Committee level.
